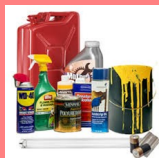
Refuse

- Aluminum foil (*contaminated with food*)
- Candy wrappers
- Cardboard roll/box with plastic wrap attached
- Ceramics, porcelain and china (*anything made of clay/glazed*)
- Clothing, fabric, and shoes (consider re-purposing or donate to a thrift store)
- Diapers (clean or dirty)
- Dryer lint and dryer sheets
- Juice boxes and pouches
- Meats, dairy, fish, poultry, seafood, etc.
- Mirrors
- Potato chip or foil cookie bags
- Sandwich, storage, sealable, and dirty plastic bags
- Windows
- Palm trees and fronds
- Polystyrene foam (*take out containers, packing material, CD cases, plastics code 6*)



NO HOUSEHOLD HAZERDOUS WASTE, ELECTRONIC WASTE OR UNIVERSAL WASTE

The following items are examples of waste that should NOT be put in any collection bin. These items should be kept separate and brought to Kings Waste Recycling Authority during their HHW collection events.



- Chemical or powder cleaners
- Paint and solvents
- Landscape care chemicals or fertilizers
- Automotive parts or chemicals
- Electronic devices (anything that turns on/off)
- Batteries and fluorescent bulbs/tubes

Recycling

PAPER:

- Office paper
- Cardboard, cereal, gift, and shoe boxes
- Chipboard boxes
- Milk cartons
- Paper bags
- Paper egg cartons
- Post-it notes, shredded paper (*must be bagged*)
- Poster board
- Telephone books, catalogs, junk-mail
- Magazines and newspapers
- Wrapping paper
- NO foil-lined paper (*goes in refuse*)
- NO wax paper (*goes in organics*)




GLASS AND METAL:

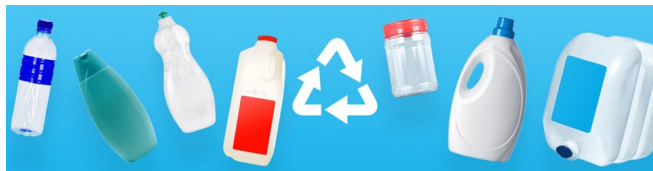
- Glass bottles, jars and lids
- Aluminum foil (*clean*)
- Aluminum, steel, and tin cans



PLASTICS:

Check the Code:  Look for the plastics code on the bottom of all plastic containers. If it has a 1,2,3,4,5, or 7 it goes in the recycling. If it has a 6 it is polystyrene and belongs in the refuse.

- Plastic bottles, containers and lids
- Plastic, non-foam plates, cups and utensils
- Dry cleaning bags
- Clean plastic grocery or green waste bags



Organics

YARD TRIMMINGS:

- Branches and tree trimmings
- Cactus
- Flowers and floral trimmings
- Grasses, weeds and leaves
- Lumber (*small pieces or sawdust from unfinished wood only*)
- NO palms, bamboo or yucca (*goes in refuse*)
- NO pots, plastic bags, flats or packs



FOOD ITEMS:

- Bakery goods, bread grains and tortillas
- Beans, lentils and other legumes
- Coffee grounds and tea leaves
- Eggshells
- Flour products (*including paper bag packaging*)
- Fruit and vegetables
- Nuts and nut shells
- Pasta and rice
- Popcorn
- Soup
- NO animal-based proteins



USED/FOOD SOILED PAPER:

- Paper coffee filters and tea bags
- Paper ice cream containers
- Used paper bags, plates, cups, napkins, tissues and towels
- Pizza boxes
- Paper take out containers
- Wax paper
- NO straws, utensils, polystyrene or plastics
- No clean paper or cardboard (*goes in recycling*)
